Professor Benjamin Brown will be the guest speaker on **Monday, November 14** at the Bonita High School library at 6 p.m. He will present information on "Composting and Vermiculture Composting". Benjamin Brown is a professor of Horticulture at Mt. San Antonio College where he teaches home gardening courses for adults of all ages. He attended Cal Poly Pomona where he received a bachelor's degree in Environmental Biology and a Masters degree in Regenerative Studies. Benjamin was awarded over 20 scholarships for his work during his educational career, including Cal Poly Pomona's President's Counsel Scholarship for 2016, and the prestigious National Garden Scholarship for 2017. Benjamin is the founder of the Regenerative Learning Gardening Project.

## Meeting held in room 205 of Bonita High School

The meeting was called to order at 6:07 p.m. by Co-President, Penny Keach. Gloria Holcomb's inspirational reading included reflections about October.

Sharon Komoto introduced our speaker for the evening, Dr. Stephanie Varnon- Hughes, a professor and administrator at Claremont-Lincoln University. Her very interesting talk was entitled, "Mindful or Mindfull: Mindfulness Practices for Busy People".

After the presentation, which included a question and answer period, we had a refreshment break. Hostesses for tonight's meeting were Betty Butler, Gloria Holcomb and Sharon Komoto.

The business meeting started afterwards. The minutes of our September meeting were accepted as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Sue Fernandes had emailed members the Treasurer's report and tonight explained the latest income items and expenditures. With a net expenditure of \$276.08, the ending balance was \$9,230.60.

Committee Reports: Ist Vice-President (Programs): Sharon Komoto previewed the next two upcoming meetings. On November 14<sup>th</sup> we will meet again at 6:00 p.m. at Bonita High School to hear Professor Benjamin Brown speak about composting. The Christmas Buffet Luncheon/Fundraiser will be held on December 3<sup>rd</sup> from 12:00 p.m. till 3:00 p.m.at the Peppertree Cafe in Glendora. We will need to know by the end of November how many members and guests are expected to attend.

2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President (Membership): Jean Bristol announced that she has been in touch with our newest members, encouraging them to attend our meetings. She has also been in contact with a prospective member, Rosa Leong, who acts as a liaison for homeless and immigrant students in the Claremont Unified School District. Continuing a discussion of recruitment, Debbie discussed her recent presentation at Bonita High School. Six teachers attended and she discussed Beta Mu activities, etc. and encouraged them to attend one of our meetings. Some of them may be coming in the future.

On a sad note, Jean Bristol announced that Anna Jean Newton (96), a long-time member of Beta Mu, had recently passed away in Idaho and Sue Fernandes told us that Judy Lewis has been having serious health problems. We will be keeping her in our thoughts and prayers.

Jean, who has been in charge of Jared Boxes for our Chapter, contacted two hospitals about resuming our practice of providing the boxes to their pediatric wings. A staff member from San Antonio Hospital told her that parents seem to prefer having their children treated in children's hospitals, therefore they no longer do in-patient pediatric care. Jean hasn't heard from Pomona Valley Hospital yet. It was suggested that Jared Boxes might be good to have in emergency rooms, for the children waiting there for care.

Jean presented our two co-presidents, Penny Keach and Debbie Sims, with their president's pin.

Jean repeated that the basket for collecting toiletries for the Inland Valley Hope Partners will be available at all our meetings.

Scholarships: Debbie also announced that she has been meeting with a first- grade teacher from Roynon Elementary School, to help her fill out the paperwork for a Penne Ferrell Scholarship.

Ways and Means: Carolyn Gomm explained more about our Christmas Fundraiser/Luncheon on December 3<sup>rd</sup>. \$10.00 has been added to the cost of the ticket, which is for the fundraiser. She said that there will be a "Gift Exchange" at our luncheon, and that more information about this will be forthcoming.

Communications: Candy Campbell handed out a draft of the Yearbook, and asked members to proofread it. She announced that she needs a picture of Christina Quon for the book.

Diane Deal has agreed to be in charge of our Newsletter, the Bond. She has already sent out one Newsletter and she hopes to send one out every two months. She will regularly include a Presidents' and Treasurer's report, as well as the latest meeting minutes. She encourages members to send her news items.

New Business: We voted for our Chapter's Most Valuable Member, to be announced at the Area XIII Conference in February.

Members wishing to attend are asked to register for this conference online and then send in their check for \$40.00 (made out to our Chapter) to Sue Fernandes as soon as possible. This year our Chapter's responsibilities include providing two people to greet attendees and sell door prize raffle tickets. We also need to provide 24 bags, which are placed in front of the gift baskets, to collect the raffle tickets. Our Chapter is also to act as host for the speaker and supply a gift for her.

It was necessary for us to officially amend our chapter rules to allow us to meet virtually.

Diane Deal moved to do so, and Jean Bristol seconded. The vote was unanimous.
